The Yaquina Head Lighthouse is part of a series of lighthouses built along the Oregon coast for ship navigation. It has the tallest tower of the Oregon lighthouses (93 feet), and was built out of 370,000 bricks. It was first lit on August 20, 1873, and is still in use today. Zabriskie Point

Zabriskie Point is one of the well-known viewpoints in Death Valley. It is a favorite of photographers at both sunrise and sunset, as the early and late sun adds texture to the badland formations in the area.

Heceta Head Lighthouse

The Heceta Head Lighthouse is another of the Oregon coast lighthouses used for navigation. Each lighthouse has a unique combination of flashes in terms of timing and color so ships know which lighthouse they are seeing (Heceta Head flashes white every 10 seconds). The lighthouse was first lit in 1893, and is still active today.


Clark's Nutcracker


The Wreck of the Peter Iredale

When ships were still wind-powered by sails, navigation into ports was tricky. On September 26, 1906, the crew of the Peter Iredale was intending to enter the mouth of the Columbia River, the final part of their journey to Portland, OR. But a sudden northwest squall blew them south of their target and grounded them on Clatsop Sands (now called Clatsop Spit). There were no casualties (the crew basically walked to shore), but they were unable to remove the ship from the beach. Only about 20 feet of the bow of the 285 foot ship still remains, but it makes a favorite visiting spot at sundown for tourists.

Tillamook Rock Lighthouse

Most of Oregon's lighthouses were not easy to get to when they were built, and thus lighthouse keepers and their families had a lonely and busy existence. They had to provide their own food and supplies when they weren't tending the lighthouse. But the Tillamook Rock Lighthouse takes difficult access to new extremes, as it is located on a small island 1.2 miles offshore. It must have been an incredibly lonely job, as well as scary at times. It had the nickname of Terrible Tilly as waves have been known to crash over the top of it (the top of the tower is 140' above the water). Not surprisingly,




Hoary Marmot

Hoary Marmots are quite common around the trails on Mount Rainier, and they are conditioned to humans so they don't move far away when you approach. (At least one hiker we met swore he almost stepped on one thinking it was a rock.) They hibernate 8-9 months out of the year, so when they are awake they eat vast amounts of meadow vegetation. 


Cape Disappointment Lighthouse
